Hippodrome Cinema

Scotland's oldest purpose-built cinema, opened in 1912, and re-opened after a £2 million revamp in 2009. See big blockbusters and classic movies in this wonderful pre-art deco building, complete with cafe/bar area and the latest sound and projection equipment. Normally open six days a week (closed Tuesdays).

Bo'ness Library

An old tavern, bakery and warehouse, dating back to the 17th century - now developed into a modern library building. Features free internet access and wi-fi, local and tourist information, and regular free exhibitions and activities. Open Mon-Sat, all year. Times vary.

Memorial to Mining

Bo'ness was one of the first places to be used for coal mining in Scotland, with links to Carron Ironworks, birthplace of the Industrial Revolution in Scotland. Its last pit closed in 1983. This memorial colliery wheel was unveiled in 2007 - and features historical information and plaques designed by local children.

Bo'ness Town Hall

Just south of the town centre, this imposing B-listed building is popular for weddings, parties, dances and other community events. Look out for special events - including popular opera and stage shows.

Kinneil Museum

Housed in the former stable block of Kinneil House, the museum features audio visual shows, a small shop area and a permanent exhibition on the 2000 years of history at Kinneil. Open all year, every day (except Tuesdays), 12.30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Kinneil House

An imposing mansion dating back to the 15th century, Kinneil boasts some of the best Renaissance wall paintings in Scotland - plus a resident ghost. Tour the grounds throughout the year and see inside the House during special open days - see website or Kinneil Museum for further details. Free.

Kinneil Fortlet & Estate

See the remains of a Roman fortlet in Kinneil Estate, a public park to the west of Bo'ness. The fortlet was part of the Antonine Wall, built around 142 AD - now a World Heritage site. The Estate also features woodland walks, ponds and historic buildings, including James Watt's cottage. Open all year. Free.

Kinneil Nature Reserve

Coastal parkland to the north of Bo'ness - once dominated by Kinneil Colliery. The area is now a haven for birds and other wildlife - and a stopping off point for the Bo'ness and Kinneil Railway. Features great walks and picnic benches, plus stunning views.

Bo'ness & Kinneil Railway

Hop aboard a train at Bo'ness Station, to the east of the town centre. Scotland's leading steam railway attracts thousands of visitors each year. It's also been used in TV and film productions, from "Outlander" to "Cloud Atlas". Look out for Thomas The Tank Engine themed days and other events. Charges vary. Seasonal café.

Bo'ness Harbour

Bo'ness was once the second-biggest port in Scotland. Today, its inner dock lies silent. However, visitors can still moor small craft in the inner harbour, now in the care of Falkirk Council. The harbour links to the extensive local paths network and is next to the town centre. Look for the yellow buoy – on display in front of the harbour – plus other pieces of public art, celebrating the area's industrial past.

Open air replica of one of the best Roman finds in Britain. An amazing piece of Roman art discovered at Bridgeness, Bo'ness, in 1868 - and once part of the Antonine Wall. Also features information about the Antonine Wall and other Roman sites to visit. Free.

Blackness Castle

Built in the 15th century by one of Scotland's most powerful families, the Crichtons. Once used as a garrison fortress and state prison. Used by Mel Gibson to film "Hamlet", and more recently as a set for the TV series "Outlander". Open all year. Admission charge.
