The Falkirk area is rich in history, with World Heritage UNESCO site the Antonine Wall, including Rough Castle, one of the best preserved Roman Forts; baronial mansion 4 star Callendar House, home to a working Georgian Kitchen, art gallery and tea-room; the Falkirk Trinity Church with the Faw Kirk Graveyard including the Tomb of Sir John de Graeme (William Wallace's right hand man); The Falkirk Steeple; Dunmore Pineapple; Kinneil House and Museum featuring excellent examples of renaissance art; 4 star Bo'ness & Kinneil Railway a working steam railway including Scotland's largest Railway museum; and the ship that never sailed Blackness Castle. You will find a number of heritage trails throughout the area so you really can immerse yourself in 2000 years of heritage.

The Falkirk Wheel



Scotland's most exciting example of 21st century engineering, The Falkirk Wheel is the world's only rotating boat lift - a breathtaking working sculpture which links the Forth & Clyde Canal to the Union Canal above.

Sail 115 ft into the air on an unforgettable boat trip - as spaces are limited - pre booking is essential.

There is a large outdoor area surrounding the wheel, pick up a coffee and snack from the outdoor food kiosks, kids can enjoy the parks and mini golf, take a stroll and uncover some of the best remains of the Antonine wall (a Unesco World Heritage site). Enjoy a Segway safari or pick up an e-bike and cycle along the canal tow paths to the Helix Park (home of the Kelpies).

For those with accessibility issues the Falkirk Wheel does operate the NEATEBOX - Welcome App. Essential companions & carers go free when accompanying a disabled visitor on a boat trip. Assistance dogs are allowed on site and on-board the boat trips.

The Helix - The home of the Kelpies



The Helix park has 350 hectares of open space which includes a lagoon, a fantastic and accessible path network, wetlands, kids adventure zone, accessible play area, trails and outdoor event space. Ideal for cycling and you can pre-book an e-bike at the Kelpies and cycle along the canal towpaths to the Falkirk Wheel.

The iewel within this project. The Kelpies, stand 30 metres tall, and are the world's largest equine sculptures. Towering over the Forth & Clyde canal, they form a dramatic gateway to the canal entrance on the Fast Coast of Scotland.

Visitors can experience the award winning Kelpies tour which takes you inside these magnificent sculptures.

The 5 star visitor centre provides a unique insight into the history of these magnificent sculptures with gift shop, café and accessible toilets.

The Tours operate from the 'Head-Down' Kelpie and are delivered on a rolling basis, so pre-booking is not required or available.

The next available Tour time will be displayed at the entrance to the Kelpie or check their website in the morning before your visit.

Callendar House and Park



4 star attraction Callendar House and Park a stunning French chateau styled house set in 170 acres of beautiful parkland.

Free to access, visit the permanent displays around the 'Story of Callendar House' from the 11th to the 19th Century and 'The Antonine Wall, Romes Nothern Frontier'. There is also a working Georgian kitchen with costumed interpreters bringing history to life, the Park Gallery, gift shop and a stunning tearoom with views over the park.

Outside, the vast parklands include sections of the ancient Roman Antonine wall, a UNESCO world heritage site and woodlands that date back hundreds of years. Many of the paths around the grounds are flat and easily accessible by wheelchair or powerchair users For the kids there is an accessible Roman themed play park, a natural play trail plus a range of outdoor activities to enjoy.


The Falkirk Trinity Church

Falkirk Trinity Church stands on the site of the historic Faw Kirk.(which gave Falkirk its name)

The graveyard contains important historical memorials from the eras of William Wallace including the Tomb of Sir John de Graeme Wallace's right hand man, who fell in the Battle of Falkirk in 1297. Other graves of the fallen from that battle can also be found in the graveyard.

Antonine Wall



The biggest, most awe-inspiring building project the people of Scotland had ever seen, the Antonine Wall stretched right across the country, from Clyde to Forth. Built by the Romans around AD142, as the north west frontier of their Empire, the wall is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

These include sites at:












Heritage Trails

The Foundry Fortunes Heritage Trail

Take the Right Route's Foundry Fortune celebrates heritage in Larbert and Stenhousemuir. This 5-mile circular trail is made up of a series of six large coin monuments which depict the different elements and processes associated with the foundry.

The large coins are made of stainless steel, mounted on granite boulders, situated along one of the heritage trails in Larbert and Stenhousemuir. The trail takes in the sights of the Carron Dams, the Lido (Crownest Park), South Broomage and Larbert Old Parish Church.

Day one

Arrive at Bo'ness; The Bo'ness and Kinneil railway is a must for kids, take a trip on the steam train, and visit the Museum of Scottish Railways where there are loads of interactive displays. For lunch the Railway has its own cafe or in Bo'ness you will find Corvi's a traditional Fish & Chip shop which has been serving one of Scotland's national dishes since 1896. Or try out the Corbie Inn's traditional pub grub, Mcmoos Icecream parlour or one of the other cafes and restaurants you will find around the town. If you have time take in the Bo'ness Motor Museum - see the Harry Potter Car and for the older kids the cars from the James bond movies, might make you smile. If the weather turns then visit the Hippodrome in Boness – Scotland's oldest purpose built cinema which runs classic and current films and finally if the kids need to run off any steam then the grounds around Kinneil House and Museum are worth a wee trip.

Next cycle (use the new EV bikes located at Union St) or get the Bo'ness community bus to Blackness Castle - described as the Ship that never sailed - the kids will love exploring this 15th century castle and be fascinated by the 'Pit Jail'. And if you get a chance try to include a visit to Mannerstons Farm shop and café where their homemade icecream is fab!.

Day two

Start your day at Callendar House & Park, 170 acres of magnificent parklands with Roman themed accessible play area and new Nature Play trail. The house itself has a working Georgian kitchen with costumed interpreters, interactive displays, and tearoom. Next you can't visit the Falkirk area without visiting the world famous Kelpies in Helix Park - the world's tallest equine sculptures - and see inside one of the horses heads. The park has a wide range of accessible walks, cycle paths, play areas, a visitor centre with café, splash play (summer only) and lagoon. If you are feeling energetic hire an e-bike and cycle to the Falkirk Wheel. Alternatively a short 10 minute drive will get you to the world's only rotating boat lift - sail 115 ft into the air in their barges, let the kids play in the parks, or have a go at the new miniature golf. Then stop off at The Milk Barn an artisan ice cream parlour for ice-cream and the kids can enjoy the play area and bouncy pillow.

If the Scottish weather is inclement a wet day itinerary could include a trip to the Mariner Centre a lagoon shaped pool with wave machine and play area for kids in the café. Wonderworld a great soft play and Airthrill trampoline park - both have cafes for the grown-ups. Tenpin Falkirk has 20 lanes and an arcade full of games. If speed is more your thing then a trip to Xtreme Karting is a must.



The Falkirk area for Historical Gems

The Falkirk area is steeped in history from the well known to some real hidden gems for you to discover! We have put some ideas together below but for the full range of historical finds check out vistfalkirk.com and our Heritage video.

Day one

Start your day in the historic Falkirk Town Centre with two heritage trails discover the stories of over 30 historical sites. Download the Falkirk town heritage trail app for an interactive tour and see what the buildings in the town centre used to look like falkirktownheritagetrail.co.uk/webapp. Some key points of interest include the Falkirk Steeple which towers 141 feet and once homed the old town jail and Falkirk Trinity Church and its historic graveyard which includes Sir John De Graeme's Tomb - William Wallace's right hand man. Callendar House and Park a 14th Century baronial mansion has parts of the Antonine Wall (a UNESCO world Heritage site) within its grounds and is just a short drive from the town centre. Inside you will find exhibitions leading you through 2000 years of history and much more. Dunmore Pineapple just outside Airth has to be one of the most quirky attractions. The Earl of Dunmore built this as a folly within the grounds of his estate and is surrounded by beautiful parkland. (And of course a trip to the world famous Kelpies and The Falkirk Wheel are a must).

Day two

Arrive at Bo'ness and Kinneil Railway and explore the Museum of Scottish Railways on site before taking a ride on a steam train. Only a few minutes' drive away is Kinneil Museum and Estate where you can enjoy walks around the Estate to see the Roman Fortlet and peruse the exhibitions in the museum. Stop off at the Bridgeness Slab on Harbour Road a replica of the largest Roman Legionary tablet found in Scotland. Bo'ness Motor Museum is a great wee hidden gem for classic cars, famous movie cars and memorabilia from 007, The Saint, Harry Potter and Thunderbirds. If you get a chance pop along to the 100 year old Bo'ness Hippodrome Scotland's first purpose built cinema, which screens a mix of latest releases, golden oldies and contemporary films. Arrive at Blackness Castle a 10 minute drive from Bo'ness or short cycle and explore the history of this 'ship that never sailed' and enjoy fantastic views across the Firth of Forth.



Falkirk by Night

After your busy days exploring all the attractions in the area here are a few of our ideas about what you can do to fill your evenings and of course check out our Falkirk by Night video for further inspiration.

With a huge array of award winning restaurants and bars many of which are Best Bar None accredited (www.bbnscotland.co.uk), catering for every taste and pocket you will be spoilt for choice when dining. Why not walk off your supper with a stroll to Helix Park to see the Kelpies at night, or take a trip to the Falkirk Wheel which is beautiful when lit up. The Falkirk Steeple in the town centre is also now illuminated at night and lovely to see. Check out the programme for the Hippodrome in Bo'ness and take in a film in Scotland's oldest cinema and if the weather is nice head down to Blackness and watch some of amazing sunsets over Blackness castle and the Firth of Forth. The annual Fireworks display with Callendar House as a backdrop is also a must.

Just a short walk from Falkirk High rail station take a walk along the Falkirk Tunnel. If you like puzzles and challenges then try one of the recently opened Escape rooms - Falkirk has two Divergent and Game over - all of which have rooms which are themed very differently!

If you fancy something more energetic you could try Xtreme Karting, Laser Tag, Trampolining, or even Bowling.

Keep an eye on the What's On section of the FTH Theatre and book tickets when it's safe to do so for an exhibition or concert. Or alternatively plan your visit around one of the Concerts (when they return) normally held in Falkirk Stadium over the summer period.



Outlander Themed Film Itinerary

Day one

Arrive at Blackness Castle and take in the castle's stunning location next to the River Forth. Explore the grounds and enter the 15th-century castle commonly known as 'the ship that never sailed'. This iconic Outlander location stands in for Fort William, and the headquarters of the infamous Black Jack Randall. Featured in Seasons 1 & 2.

Next, drive to Bo'ness and Kinneil Railway (roughly only 10 mins by car or 20 minutes if you cycle — ebikes are available to hire in Union St Boness) where you'll be able to stand on the very spot filming took place in 2013. Bo'ness and Kinneil Railway was transformed in season 1 of Outlander to a war-time London train station which saw Claire and Frank say their goodbyes.

Afterwards, enjoy a trip on the working heritage steam railway or go next door to Scotland's largest railway museum and enjoy the fun interactive displays which explain the history of the railway.

Finally drive to Muiravonside Country Park. The acres of woodland and parkland became the backdrop to the Battle of Prestonpans in season 2, and doubled as a British encampment as well as the English countryside. And while you are there say hello to some of the Highland cows and other animals you will find on site.

Day two

As you make your way to the first Outlander location of the day, stop by the Kelpies in the Helix Park - you can't come to Falkirk and not be astounded at the world's largest equine sculptures. Have a wander around the many paths you will find in the park or take a Kelpies tour which will take you inside the magnificent sculptures.

Roughly ten minutes' drive from the Helix park you will find Callendar House and Park. Explore the 14th century house which is situated in the midst of the picturesque 170 acre Callendar Park. The authentic Georgian working kitchen features in season 2 of Outlander as part of the home of the Duke of Sandringham, Bellhurst Manor.

Gray Buchanan Park in Polmont is next on the itinerary, roughly a 20 min drive. Part of season 4 was filmed at Gray Buchanan which saw a graveyard created in the park.

Lastly, before your trip to Falkirk ends pop by the Falkirk Wheel to visit the world's only rotating boatlift and enjoy a boat trip which will take you 115 ft high in the air. If you have time have a walk round the grounds and discover parts of the Antonine wall on site, pick up an e-bike and cycle to the Kelpies or have a tour on a Segway.



Accessibility Itinerary

Start your visit to the Falkirk area with a trip to the iconic Falkirk Wheel, the world's only rotating boat lift. A fantastic place for families to spend the morning. With boat trips, a visitor centre and gift shop, kids play areas and a range of activities. On one level and accessible for visitors with limited mobility, a number of disabled parking spaces and wheelchairs, mobility scooters and assistance dogs can be taken on-board the boat trip.

A short drive from the Falkirk Wheel, The Mariner Leisure Centre in Camelon has activities for all the family to enjoy. The Great Mariner Reef soft play is for children up to the age of 12 and includes a seating area and café for parents and carers to relax and watch all the fun, it has wheelchair access and a changing places toilet. There is also plenty of free parking, including disabled spaces, at entrance level.


Next door to the Mariner Leisure Centre, you'll find the Forth Valley Sensory Centre. It has a sensory garden that has been designed as a place for those with a sensory impairment to relax and enjoy a fully accessible café and child-friendly sensory room.

Head into the centre of Falkirk for a spot of retail therapy and refreshments in the Howgate Shopping Centre. It's a short drive from The Mariner Centre and there's plenty of disabled parking on site. The centre is committed to providing an inclusive shopping experience and is the first in Scotland to be certified as autism friendly.

Round off the day at The Helix Park home to the majestic Kelpies, the largest equine sculptures in the world. Designed to be accessible to all visitors and includes a wide range of outdoor attractions for all the family and a fully accessible Visitor Centre, a changing places toilet and a play area.
